VFW Annual Voice of Democracy and Patriot's Pen Competitions Have Kicked Off

Commander Lary Burns of Post 3783 Ramona of the Veterans of Foreign Wars announces the VFW's annual Patriot's Pen and Voice of Democracy Competition is underway. Themes for 2021-22

Voice of Democracy is: ***America: Where Do We Go from Here?***

Established in 1947, our **Voice of Democracy** audio-essay program provides high school students with the unique opportunity to express themselves in regards to a democratic and patriotic-themed recorded essay. Each year, nearly 64,500 9-12 grade students from across the country enter to win their share of more than \$2 million in educational scholarships and incentives awarded through the program.

The national first place winner receives a \$30,000 scholarship paid directly to the recipient's American university, college or vocational/technical school. A complete list of other national scholarships range from \$1,000-\$16,000, and the first place winner from each VFW Department (state) wins a minimum scholarship of \$1,000.

Each year more than 165,400 students in grades 6-8 enter the VFW's **Patriot's Pen** youth essay contest for a chance to win their share of more than \$1.4 million in state and national awards. Each first place state winner receives a minimum of \$500 at the national level, and the national first place winner wins \$5,000!

The essay contest encourages young minds to examine America's history, along with their own experiences in modern American society, by drafting a 300- to 400-word essay, expressing their views based on a patriotic theme chosen by the VFW Commander-in-Chief.



This image of an eagle perched atop a gravestone was snapped at Fort Snelling National Cemetery in Minneapolis, Minnesota, by amateur photographer Frank Glick during the Spring of 2011. The symbolism of such a setting seems particularly apropos since the Bald Eagle is our national bird and features prominently the Great Seal of the United States. Images of eagles are also associated with concepts of freedom and patriotism and are commonly found in military insignia.

An article in the Minneapolis Star Tribune (<http://www.startribune.com/local/124543223.html>) described how Frank Glick came to snap this striking photograph: A crow that first caught Glick's attention as it was flying around erratically. Glick got out his Nikon camera and followed the crow. The time was around 6 a.m. on a hazy spring day and he was driving through Fort Snelling National Cemetery because he was early for a meeting.

Glick is an amateur photographer but always carries his camera, just in case. So he followed the crow, which in some cultures is a symbol of good luck and magic, and then he saw it...a huge eagle perched on a tombstone, its eyes alert, its head craned, looking for prey. In the foreground, dew glistened on the grass. Glick got his shot.

The eagle had landed on the grave of Sgt. Maurice (Maury) Ruch. Maury, who stood 6 feet 4 inches tall, graduated from college in mechanical engineering in December of 1941 and enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps. Known for his keen eye, he became a rifle marksman and was stationed in the Aleutian Islands. He served four years in the military, earned a bronze star, and had been a member of the St. Anthony Kiwanis Club.

The story also tells how this picture made it to Maury's best friend, Jack Kiefner, and to his wife Vivian. Jack and Maury had been friends for 60 years and Maury and Vivian were married for 55 years until his passing in 1988. Sgt. Maurice Ruch passed away at age 86 from a form of Parkinson's.

Post 3783 is gearing up for our annual Veteran's Day Buddy Poppy Drive campaign.

The Veteran's Day Buddy Poppy drive will go down on Friday November 12th, Saturday November 13th, and Sunday November 14th. Sign-up sheets will be posted. (See below article)

The NJROTC and Scout Troops usually sign up for 10 shifts which leaves 54 open shifts.

All we ask is three (3) hours of your time to cover one shift. (You can do more than one shift if you'd like to and if your schedule can support that)

Please pick up your Buddy Poppy cans and other items at the Post, prior to starting your shift. We are seeking to get just \$1.00 more than the Memorial Day Drive, which all of your hard work and effort garnered a record of over \$15,000.00.

History of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving at Plymouth

In September 1620, a small ship called the Mayflower left Plymouth, England, carrying 102 passengers—an assortment of religious separatists seeking a new home where they could freely practice their faith and other individuals lured by the promise of prosperity and land ownership in the New World. After a treacherous and uncomfortable crossing that lasted 66 days, they dropped anchor near the tip of Cape Cod, far north of their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. One month later, the Mayflower crossed Massachusetts Bay, where the Pilgrims, as they are now commonly known, began the work of establishing a village at Plymouth.

Throughout that first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from an Abenaki Indian who greeted them in English. Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto, a member of the Pawtuxet tribe who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain and sold into slavery before escaping to London and returning to his homeland on an exploratory expedition. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which would endure for more than 50 years and tragically remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as America's "first Thanksgiving"—although the Pilgrims themselves may not have used the term at the time—the festival lasted for three days. While no record exists of the historic banquet's exact menu, the Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow wrote in his journal that Governor Bradford sent four men on a "fowling" mission in preparation for the event, and that the Wampanoag guests arrived bearing five deer. Historians have suggested that many of the dishes were likely prepared using traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. Because the Pilgrims had no oven and the Mayflower's sugar supply had dwindled by the fall of 1621, the meal did not feature pies, cakes or other desserts, which have become a hallmark of contemporary celebrations.

Thanksgiving Traditions

In many American households, the Thanksgiving celebration has lost much of its original religious significance; instead, it now centers on cooking and sharing a bountiful meal with family and friends. Turkey, a Thanksgiving staple so ubiquitous it has become all but synonymous with the holiday, may or may not have been on offer when the Pilgrims hosted the inaugural feast in 1621. Today, however, nearly 90 percent of Americans eat the bird—whether roasted, baked or deep-fried—on Thanksgiving, according to the National Turkey Federation. Other traditional foods include stuffing, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie. Volunteering is a common Thanksgiving Day activity, and communities often hold food drives and host free dinners for the less fortunate.

Parades have also become an integral part of the holiday in cities and towns across the United States. Presented by Macy's department store since 1924, New York City's Thanksgiving Day parade is the largest and most famous, attracting some 2 to 3 million spectators along its 2.5-mile route and drawing an enormous television audience. It typically features marching bands, performers, elaborate floats conveying various celebrities and giant balloons shaped like cartoon characters.

Beginning in the mid-20th century and perhaps even earlier, the president of the United States has "pardoned" one or two Thanksgiving turkeys each year, sparing the birds from slaughter and sending them to a farm for retirement. 
